

## The Cup Mark 14:32-52

## Main Idea

Jesus drank the cup of God's wrath that you might taste the immensity of his sufficiency.

## Overview

- Jesus Tasted Your Pain That You Might Know His Love
  - o Author painting Picture of both Jesus being fully God and fully man
    - Gethsemane gives us a clear picture of the humanity of Jesus wrestling with obedience
      - Jesus had to be human in order to purchase mankind back from spiritual death
      - He was made like humanity in every way as we are (Heb. 2.14) yet w/o sin (2 Cor. 5.21)
  - Jesus asks for hour and cup to be removed from Him
    - Hour = Appointed time for him to go forward as a sacrifice for sin
    - Cup = Language of the 1T/OT regarding the Cup of Wrath/Fury of God (Hab. 2.16, Ez.23, Is. 51.7)
    - Jesus ultimate desire to be in the will of God
      - Not two wills of God ("not my will but your will") there is one will of God
      - We are seeing the humanity of Jesus wrestling w/ obedience, but ultimately he
        does obey illustrating how one wrestles in suffering & obeys
  - Why would He suffer so much? Why is He here in the Garden laboring so much though He had done no wrong?
    - Because we put Him there
    - He came to drink the Cup of God's wrath so that we who repent and believe do not have to
    - Christ endured this suffering that we might see, most clearly the love of God
    - Christ knew He would be disobeyed and yet He still went...this is LOVE!
- Jesus' love rises to meet & answer your betrayal
  - o Jesus drops off disciples and tells them to watch
    - Falls face down and prays
    - In His anguish, Jesus prayed (He always prayed)
  - Upon His return He finds the Disciples sleeping as they were the other two times He came to check on them
    - Jesus rebukes them & tells them to pray that THEY wouldn't fall into temptation
      - The Spirit is willing but the flesh is weak
  - Jesus comes out of the Garden with resolve, strengthened for what is coming
    - Rises to meet betrayers
    - Judas betrays
    - Disciples flee just as Jesus (and the Scriptures) said He would

Jesus walked into all of this motivated by Love for His children

## Questions

Discussion Starter: Discuss any time where someone has been able to identify with a particular struggle you have and how that encouraged you in your own struggle. OR Discuss some recent world events of catastrophic portions – how does Christianity make unique claims about suffering?

- 1. How does the humanity of Jesus encourage you in the day to day?
- 2. How does Jesus struggling in the Garden possibly encourage you?
- 3. How is Jesus' "cup" different than other Christian martyrs?
- 4. Why did Jesus have to drink the "cup of God's Wrath?"
- 5. How do we live as if Jesus sipped the cup and not drank it dry?
- 6. What is the motive for all of this...i.e. why is Jesus walking INTO all of this?
- 7. Why could we conclude that this act of Love is the most significant acts of love in all of history?
- 8. Jesus enters the garden in anguish and leaves with great resolve. What makes the difference and how does this inform the way we live?
- 9. How are we similar to the Disciples in their behavior surrounding the events of this evening?
- 10. Why might prayer be so important?
