



## Injustice, Judgment, & Hope

Micah 3:1-4:8

## Main Idea

Injustice kindles the Judgment of God, but His kindness brings the remnant a Shepherd King who is the Lord.

## Overview

- What Kindles God's Judgment?
  - Using People Instead of Serving Them Kindles God's Judgment
    - The leaders are using people for selfish gain rather than serving them
    - "Because" of their evil deeds God will not hear them when they cry out for mercy
  - Using God Instead of Serving Him Kindles God's Judgment
    - The prophets were using God to make money rather than serving God
    - "Therefore" God will not speak to them anymore
  - Using God's Grace instead of Truly Worshipping Him Kindles God's Judgment
    - The rulers thrived on cruelty and corruption. Priests ministered more for greed than for God. Prophets preached for their own riches not for the people's righteousness.
    - "Therefore" God will destroy the temple, which symbolized his presence
- What is the Nature of God's Judgment?
  - God's Judgment is Consistent with his Character
    - God's judgment is not some uncalculated erratic involuntary reflex
    - It's God's patient, loving, necessary reaction against sin
  - God's Judgment Brings Separation
    - Verse 4: God will turn his face away
    - Verse 7: God will shut his mouth
    - Verse 12: God will destroy the temple, the place symbolizing his presence
- What hope is found in God's judgment?
  - From Judgment Rises the Hope to Commune with & Know God
    - God will come to his people and teach them so that they might walk in his ways
  - From Judgment Rises the Hope of Great Shepherd-King
    - He will bring a kingdom marked by grace and peace, not greed and poverty
    - He will be a Shepherd-King who compassionately rules over his people forever
