## You Are Not A Christian If You Love Your Sin More Than The Savior

1 John 2.15-17

Main Idea

If your desire is to Love your own passions & desires more than you love the passions & desires of God, then the love of God is not in you.

## Overview

I. Do not love the world or the things in the world, if anyone loves the world the love of the Father is not in him

- The word "world" is used in different ways:
  - World=humanity (John 3.16, etc.)
  - World=physical creation (Acts 17.24)
  - World=broken agendas of humanity (1 John 2.15)
    - Vs. 16: Example of those agendas:
      - Passions & desires that are rooted in our love of self
- Love is a "Master" or a "Governor" and all of us follow one of the two loves in this passage
  - o What we need is a PROPER Master that will lead us into the light of life
  - You cannot serve two masters (Matthew 6.24)
- "Love" in vs. 15 is a present active verb: Saying you cannot persist or keep on loving the world or the things in the world
  - The true Christian will repent for sin
  - This illustrates that they are governed or controlled by the Greater love and have the Father's love in them
  - Galatians 5.16-24 illustrates what this "warfare" looks like
    - We are to crucify our flesh (not imbibe it)
    - When we are mastered by the love of the Father we see the world for what it was and will be

## <u>Questions</u>

Discussion Starter: Discuss some rivals and what it would look like to love both sides. Is it even possible while maintaining true love to both?

- 1. Read Matthew 6:24. Why is true that we cannot love two things that rival one another?
- 2. Read 1 John 2:15-17. What does John mean with the word "world"? How is it different than "world" in John 3.16?
- 3. What is it about the world (as it is used here) that is opposed to the Father's love?
- 4. What does it mean to "love" as John uses it here?

- 5. How does Galatians 5:16-24 provide commentary on 1 John 2:16? Discuss how the "desires of the flesh" are opposed to "desires of the Spirit" and how this rivalry plays out in your life.
- 6. Is the love of the Father a love that constrains? Is this good or bad? Do other loves constrain? How so?
- 7. Take some time to discuss how the Father's love sets you into the grooves you were meant to live in. How is it sexual purity (not sexual immorality), self-control (not anger), sobriety (not drunkenness) ultimately provide us a greater love instead of giving into these things for immediate joys?
- 8. What does this struggle look like in your lives? What are some places that are teasing you to give into prideful passions and desires?

Accountability Question: Discuss the ways you are being tempted to love the world or the things in the world.
