

A Shepherd & Gods Flock

1 Peter 5.1-5

Main Idea

Pastors should be men who feed, care for, and exercise oversight in a manner that willfully seeks to serve and build up Gods people in the faith. The flock should submit to that leadership as to the Lord and be humble, not proud.

<u>Overview</u>

• Shepherd the flock of God by feeding and caring:

- Peter writes as one who has experienced all he is calling them to (vs. 1)
- Shepherd has within its meaning the ideas of feeding, caring, and ruling:
 - Feeding: Feed the word of God as that is the only thing that brings health
 - Caring: Utilizing the word in a manner that is personal and intimate
- Shepherd the flock of God by exercising Christ like oversight:
 - Oversight means to be leading through watching over the flock:
 - Elders/Pastors/Overseers/Bishops are charged to guide the sheep which demands they be watching over any weaknesses
 - Not under compulsion, but willingly as God would have you (vs. 2)
 - Pastors should not have to be made to Pastor
 - Christ was not MADE to Pastor...He willingly laid down His life (Jhn 10)
 - \circ Not for shameful gain, but eagerly
 - Pastors should not be looking to get something shamefully but give something gladly
 - Christ became shameful so He could take the shame away from others (Phil. 2)
 - Not domineering over those in your charge, but examples (vs. 3):
 - Pastors should not rule with a heavy hand, but should be Gentle, yet firm
 - Christ was a servant leader who was both gentle when needed and firm when needed...He was no autocrat that was heavy handed (though He could have been)
 - Pastors will receive an unfading crown of glory for their work (vs. 4)
 - Flock should not be proud, but Humble
 - Younger people are reminded that they (like others, Heb. 13.17) should be subject to the elders
 - All people in the church should be humble toward one another
 - God opposes the proud
 - But He gives grace to the humble
 - Christ was humble, this is the spirit of the Triune God...so it should be with us that take His name

Questions

Discussion Starter: Discuss the traits of some good/bad leaders. Talk about why you like/dislike them then move into how Peter describes leaders of God's church.

- 1. Read 1 Peter 5:1-5. In these verses, Peter is addressing "elders." Why is it profitable for those who are not elders to understand this passage?
- 2. Verse 1 starts with "So..." How does this passage connect to the previous parts of Peter's letter? What implication does this have for you as you face suffering?
- 3. In verse 1 Peter identifies with the sufferings of fellow elders. How does this inform his exhortations?
- 4. The main command is for elders to "shepherd the flock of God that is among you." What does this mean that pastors are to be doing? Use the imagery of a real shepherd to help.
- 5. What is it about feeding and caring that are so important for pastors? Why would God want them to dedicate their time towards this?
- 6. How does the addition "flock of God" inform the shepherding they are to do?
- 7. What does it mean to shepherd/pastor under compulsion, and why is this bad? Why is pastoring willingly good?
- 8. What does it look like for an elder to shepherd/pastor "not for shameful gain, but eagerly?"
- 9. What does it look like for an elder to shepherd/pastor "not domineering over those in charge, but being examples to the flock?"
- 10. How can you be subject to the elders of a church (cf. Hebrews 13.17)?
- 11. What does pride look like inside the church? Humility?
- 12. How does Christ picture both the Great Shepherd as well as the "great" flock?

Accountability question: Identify pride in your life and talk about what it looks like to be humble in that area.
