To Obey is Better than to Sacrifice

1 Samuel 12-15

Main Idea

We should be suspicious of our own inclinations and trust the Word of the Lord.

Overview

- In Samuel 12 Samuel is "remembering" them into obedience not guilting them obedience
 - He does this by reminding them of all the times God had been faithful/gracious to them
 - o He also reminds them that they have been the ones that are quick to forget Him (v 9)
 - Their Trusting God (not themselves) will have things to go well, if they don't, things will go poorly as it has (v 14-15)
- 1 Samuel 13 shows that Saul was unfaithful to obey the word of the Lord as told by the prophet Samuel
 - 1 Samuel 10.8 shows us that Saul was supposed to wait seven days and then get direction from Samuel
 - In the face of the enemy and a disparaging Israelite army, Saul circumvents Gods word and disobeys Samuels direction
 - God tears away His kingdom because of His disobedience (v 14)
- 1 Samuel 14 shows the faithfulness of Jonathan up against the foolishness of Saul
 - Jonathan trusts God to defeat their enemy (v 6)
 - Saul adds rules to Gods army though the spoils had been given them (v 24)
 - Jonathan disobeys the rule unknowingly (v 27)
 - o Israelites are so famished they eat food in an inappropriate manner (with blood) (v 33)
- 1 Samuel 15 God decrees the Amalekites be destroyed in light of their behavior towards Gods people (Deut. 25.17-19, Exodus 17.14-15, Numbers 24.20)
 - Saul does not obey the word of the Lord and saves King Agag and cattle as a religious offering to the Lord (v 9)
 - He thinks he did a good thing (v 14-16)
 - Samuel rebukes Saul and tells him that it is better to obey than to sacrifice (v 22-23)
 - Samuel finishes the job by killing Agag (v 33)

Questions

Discussion Starter: Why is it easier to try and pay off a wrong instead of actually just doing right to begin with?

- 1. Read 1 Samuel 12. Describe the warning of Samuel to the Israelites. How is he motivating them towards obedience?
- 2. Do you feel like when you read the Bible or try and live a faithful Christian life that God is "guilting" you into obedience because He sent His Son? In what way is this not the case? How does God motivate our obedience?
- 3. Read 1 Samuel 13:8-15. What was wrong with Saul's behavior in advance of the fight? Why would God not be happy about Saul's sacrifice and impending action?
- 4. In what ways do we do 'religious things' instead of actually trusting what God has made clear? Why do we do this?
- 5. How did Saul illustrate exactly what Samuel's history lesson taught back in chapter 12?

- 6. Read 1 Samuel 14:6-15. Describe the faith of Jonathan in chapter 14. Describe the faith of Saul in 13-15. How are they similar? How are they different? How can you relate?
- 7. Why does God want to destroy the Amalekites and be peaceful towards the Kenites (cf. Dt. 25:17-19)?
- 8. What is it about the holiness of God that calls for Him to take such aggressive behavior?
- 9. Read 1 Samuel 15:7-26. How did Saul interpret his own behavior? How did God & Samuel interpret Saul's behavior? What was the difference between the two?
- 10. What are ways that we 'sacrifice' instead of simply obeying?
- 11. Read 1 Samuel 15:27-33. How does the Gospel speak into this portion of the story?

Accountability question: What are some ways you are sacrificing instead of actually obeying what God has made clear?
