

Anger and Its Answer

Matthew 5.21-26

Overview

- Murder:
 - Jesus affirms the authority of the 1T/OT (vss. 17-20) and He does the same with the teaching against murder here in vs. 21 (Exodus 20.13, Deut. 5.17) as well as the necessity of a council for those who have wronged the Law (Deut. 16.18-20)
- Anger:
 - Jesus is not adding any teaching, He is helping His disciples see deeper into the teaching that is already there:
 - He is denouncing not only murder, but all the things that lead to murder
- Murder is the fruit of anger
- You do not have hate/murder without anger:
- Judgment/Hell
 - The Pharisees Scribes had only been judging the external acts of murder, not the inward attitudes of anger:
 - Jesus affirms the Sovereignty of God of all things, not just external acts
 - The Pharisees and Scribes had only been pointing people to earthly councils and not pointing them to the eternal judgment of God for sin:
 - Jesus was showing the deeper, more comprehensiveness of judgment
 - o If Murder/Anger is not checked, this is the destiny of those that give into murder
- Pursue Peace with Pace:

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- "If you are offering your gift at the altar" is language of a religious sacrifice:
 - Jesus is commanding you leave it in order to pursue peace (that's how important it is)
 - He also says in vs. 25 to "come to terms QUICKLY"
- \circ $\,$ Jesus desires reconciliation more than sacrifice ("to obey is better than to sacrifice") $\,$
 - He says His disciples are peacemakers (5.9)
- That's what God has done for us in Christ:
 - Though angry, He pursued peace with us in Christ

Questions

Discussion Starter: Do you see the cry for justice in our world? Where do you think this comes from? How does the cry for justice play into the Gospel?

- 1. Read Matthew 5:21-26. Why would murder be wrong to God?
- 2. How does Jesus connect murder to anger from the command? Why does He do it?
- 3. What is the motivation of our sinful anger? Is there ever a time for righteous anger (cf. Eph. 4:26)? How can you tell the difference?
- 4. What does Jesus say happens to those that are given to anger? (Read Galatians 5.19-21)
- 5. Why does Jesus desire peace so much and so quickly?
- 6. Is it easier for you to "offer a sacrifice" than to leave it and go and make peace? If so, why?

- 7. Why is it so difficult for us to pursue peace with others (especially those that have things against us)?
- 8. How does the Bible describe God's anger? Where can we get encouragement towards faithfulness in peacemaking?
- 9. Describe how we learn how to deal with our anger and pursue peace in the Gospel.
