

## What Is Your Foundation?

Matthew 7:24-27

Main Idea

Jesus final words repeatedly ask, us, "What are you going to do with me and my teaching?" Specifically, regarding verses 24-27, Jesus tells us we can either build our life on him, the solid rock, or on ourselves/the world, shifting sand.

## <u>Overview</u>

- Examining the Foundation of Your Life (vv. 24, 26)
  - o This sermon is for those who "hear my words"
  - Everyone is building their house on someone or something
  - Everyone is building on the rock or sand
    - Rock that which is secure, steadfast, immoveable; Jesus words, which equate to God (cf. Dt. 32; Psalm 19; 31; 62)
    - Sand that which is weak, fragile, and insecure
  - Building requires hearing and doing
    - Knowledge alone is not enough

## • Evaluating the Outcome of Your Foundation (vv. 25, 27)

- Jesus does not say "if the rain, floods and wind" come, but "and the rain, floods and wind" come – the storms are coming no matter where you build
- The rains, flood, and wind represent both temporary troubles and eternal judgment
  - We know they ultimately point to eternal judgment because this is the subject on Jesus' mind (cf. v. 13, 19, 23)
- "On that day" everyone will stand on the solid rock of Christ or great will be their fall

## <u>Questions</u>

- 1. Read Matthew 7:13-27. What do you notice about Jesus final words in the Sermon on the Mount? Why do you think he chose to end his sermon this way?
- 2. Jesus says, *"those who hear these words of mine."* What does that tell us about the audience and why is that important to understand?
- 3. What does it mean to build your life on the rock? On the sand?
- 4. What are some of the "sand" things people try to build their life on? Why do they fail us?
- 5. Practically speaking, according to Jesus, how can we determine which foundation we're building on? What does that look like in the day-to-day?
- 6. It appears the rain, floods, and wind represent both temporary troubles and eternal judgment:
  - a. Why is it important to realize Jesus is talking about temporary troubles and eternal judgment?
  - b. What helps us get through the temporary troubles in this life?
  - c. How does context help you see that Jesus is ultimately pointing to eternal judgment?
  - d. Discuss how God can be a God of love and a God of judgment.
- 7. Where does the gospel apply to Jesus words and what hope does that give us?

**Accountability Question**: Are there areas of your life in which your foundation is more sand than rock?
