Cautionary Kings

1 Kings 17

APPLY // 1 KINGS 14-16

Main Idea: Corrupt kings, who reject God's word, leave us yearning for Christ the King, who fulfills God's word.

- 1. How does the holiness of God demand the justice of God? In what way is this loving? How should this inform the way we view our sin? The gospel?
- 2. How is the Lord's faithfulness seen in these chapters, especially when look at Asa?
- 3. Looking at Asa, why does he please the Lord? How is Jesus similar? How should we respond?

OBSERVE & INTERPRET // 1 KINGS 17

Main Idea: God's prophet believes and acts on God's word—and this brings life!

- 1. Read 1 Kings 17:1-7. What new person are we introduced to in this passage? What do we know about Elijah from this passage?
- 2. What is Elijah's view of the Lord?
- 3. Read Deuteronomy 11:16-27; 28:22-24. Connect this to what Elijah says. How do Elijah's words show us what he believed about God's word? Contrast this with the kings from chapters 14-16. What is the author's aim in arranging the passage with this contrast?
- 4. How does the Lord provide for Elijah?
- 5. What do verses 1-7 show us about the character of the Lord?
- 6. Read 1 Kings 17:8-16. What does this passage tell us about the character of the Lord?
- 7. The woman in this passage is from Zarephath "which belongs to Sidon." We learn a bit about Sidon in 16:31. Why is that significant? How does this passage show that God is not tribal deity?
- 8. Read 1 Kings 17:17-24. What does this passage tell us about the character of the Lord?
- 9. How does the woman act when trouble comes her way? How does Elijah act when trouble comes his way?
- 10. In verse 24, what is the woman's final conclusion of God, Elijah, and God's word?
- 11. Contrast this non-Jewish woman with the Jewish kings. What's the author's point in making this contrast?
- 12. Discuss the ways 1 Kings 17 points us to the greater Elijah, Jesus Christ. See Luke 7:11-17 for an event similar to 1 Kings 17:1-24, yet note the differences.

ACCOUNTABILITY
